# Regular Meeting December 18, 2024

### **MINUTES**

#### A. Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education was called to order by President James Petrie on December 18, 2024, at 8:31 a.m.

# C. Pledge of Allegiance

Member Beri, supported by Member Blackmon, moved to approve the agenda as presented. On voice vote, the motion carried 3-0.

E. Public Participation – Terri Hughes, President of the Harper Woods School District Board of Education and President of the Wayne County Association of School Boards (WCASB), addressed the board to thank them for their service. Ms. Hughes also thanked Wayne RESA Superintendent, Dr. Daveda Colbert and Sr. Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis for their continuous support and assistance.

# G. President's Remark and Board Comments

**Member Beri** attended the Association of Educational Service Agencies (AESA) Annual Conference in December and shared how well organized the conference was. Over 950 participants attended the conference. Member Beri highlighted sessions he attended including:

Talent Together – A session where Dr. Colbert and Beth Gonzales both presented on the
consortium comprised of 56 Michigan ISDs that provides pathways to degrees and
certification at no costs to participants.

- Universal Pre-K A session in which Beth Gonzalez was a presenter, along with Dr. Sophia Lafayette-Lause, former RESA employee and current Director of GSRP, Early Childhood Education, and Family Services with MiLEAP.
- An AI presentation that was very impressive and interactive.
- A session on renewable energy and a rural district's implementation of solar panels and battery operations, due to anticipated demands for electricity.

**Member Funderburg** shared that she, Member Blackmon and Member Jackson attended the National Association of Black School Educators (NABSE) Conference in November. Member Funderburg spoke to the representation of educators in attendance. She also appreciated the opportunity to hear from one of RESA's own, Sandra Dukhie, Executive Director, who presented as Ferndale Public Schools Board President alongside Ferndale Superintendent, Dr. Camille Hibbler on teambuilding and changing the dynamics of how things were ran in their district.

Member Funderburg also shared that she attended a session linked with the Push Out Effort documentary that spoke to helping Black girls connect with education and breaking stereotypes.

**Member Jackson** shared highlights from the NABSE Conference including the 2400 attendees and the NABSE's Youth Program that takes 50-100 students to a Black college/university and each year and provides scholarships.

**Member Blackmon** shared that during the NABSE governance commission meeting, the chair asked participants to introduce themselves and say what they were most proud of, and RESA participants had much to say about Wayne RESA and Superintendent, Dr. Daveda Colbert, and her leadership not only in the state but throughout the country. Member Blackmon also shared that two of the founding members of NABSE, Dr. Charles Mitchell and Dr. Russell Jackson were honored during the conference. Dr. Charles Mitchell served as Highland Park Public Schools superintendent and continues to leave a legacy in Michigan by starting a scholarship with Michigan Association of African American Superintendents committing to a \$50,000 donation.

Member Blackmon acknowledged the passing of Romulus City Councilwoman Virgina Williams who was active in many organizations and left quite a record of accomplishment and achievement uplifting her community.

Member Blackmon also thanked Terri Hughes, WCASB President for the outstanding end of year event for Wayne County School Board members and wished everyone a happy holiday season with hopes that everyone enjoys time with family and friends.

**President Petrie** took a moment during the last board meeting of the calendar year to reflect on the accomplishments of the Board and the RESA organization during 2024, noting the expansion of literacy efforts across Wayne County and the partnership with the Wayne County Executive's Office and Commission. President Petrie also congratulated everyone who was involved in the passing on the Regional Enhancement Millage Renewal which was a marvelous way to finish the year and reflected how voters feel about the 33 school districts and 97 public school academies in Wayne County.

President Petrie also shared the following highlights from Wayne County Schools –

Allen Park - Congratulations to Allen Park High School's Liliana Garza who earned a
coveted spot in the Michigan School Vocal Music Association's (MSVMA) Region C
Honors Choir, continuing Allen Park High School's proud tradition of excellence in
choral music.

Also, congratulations to Allen Park's Arno Elementary for being recognized by U.S. News & World Report as one of the Top Performing Elementary Schools in the State of Michigan. Arno Elementary Ranked #359 out of 1,943 Michigan Elementary Schools. The prestigious recognition reflects the incredible dedication of Allen Park's students, families, teachers, staff, and administration.

**DPSCD** – Congratulations to the Cass Technicians who dominated the field to reclaim the 2024 MHSAA Division 1 Football State Championship.

**Ecorse** – Congratulations to Ecorse eSports on their playoff run at the Championship. The Apex team Angel G., Kabain A., and Raysean S. placed third in the State of Michigan while the Fortnite Team Tre'von M. and Carlita S. took fifth place.

**Northville** - Congratulations to Northville High School senior Arjun Saini who was honored as one of six recipients of the Youth Volunteer of the Year Award at the 2024 Governor's Service Awards. Through his nonprofit, MPower All, Arjun has mobilized over 2,500 volunteers across 30 impactful projects, inspiring youth leadership and making a difference in diverse communities.

**Plymouth-Canton** – Congratulations to the Plymouth Canton Community District's eSports Club who leveled up at the Michigan High School eSports League in Lansing, taking home 2nd place out of over 100 schools in the Super Smash Bros: Ultimate Tournament.

**H.** Communications – President Petrie acknowledged the letter received from Michigan State Superintendent Dr. Michael Rice and State Board of Education President Pamela Pugh congratulating RESA on the passage of the recent Millage Renewal proposal.

### I. Presentations

1. Performance by The Robichaud Marching Bulldogs – Under the direction of Band & Choir Director, Brad Avis, students representing the Robichaud High School Marching Bulldogs performed selections during the Wayne RESA Board of Education meeting. Student performers were given the opportunity to introduce themselves and Westwood Community School District Superintendent, Dr. Stiles Simmons, thanked RESA for the invitation and allowing Westwood Community School District to share their talents with the organization. Special recognition was given to Westwood Community School District School Board Trustee, Ms. Sarah Ward and Vice President, Ms. Angela Hopkins who were in attendance for the performance.

2. Engaging Adolescent Learners: A Focus on Disciplinary Literacy and Access to High Quality Texts – Dr. Laura Gabrion, Literacy Consultant; Cherron Ramsey, Mathematics Consultant; Dr. Rosalyn Shahid, Literacy Consultant; and Mari Treece, Executive Director of Educational Services presented information on Disciplinary Literacy Origins: Social Justice and Student Activism and shared examples and foundational documents of Disciplinary Literacy along with current models and initiatives in action. This included updates from professional developments held in October and November 2024, the Meaningful Mathematics & STEM Showcase, Boys College Summer Literacy Institute, Detroit Public Schools Community District and Wayne RESA Project 1619, and the 2024 G.R.E.E.N. Summer. Board members were asked to save-the-date for the Wayne County Teaching Diverse Histories Summit, August 13-14, 2025, a two-day summit on how to teach inclusive and comprehensive history.

# J. Superintendent's Report

# Senior Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis

Mr. Latvis shared the following updates:

- Lame duck has resulted in bills being sent back and forth between the Senate and House. The week of December 7, the House had an agenda of a combined 150 bills which they intended to take up. Legislature should wrap up the week of December 16, with the Senate having 17 education-related bills on its agenda and the House having 14.
- Changes to PA 152 were passed in each chamber last week, with the bills setting an 80% floor for what districts would pay for employee healthcare costs, while also setting an escalated hard cap that would also serve as a maximum for what districts could pay. The estimated impact that this would have on districts if the bills pass would be somewhere between \$150-200 million statewide just for schools. It would also impact universities, community colleges and municipalities.

# Deputy Superintendent of Educational Services, Beth Gonzalez

Ms. Gonzalez shared the following update:

- The RESA Multilingual Team has been working collaboratively with the Michigan
  Department of Education, Oakland Schools and a number of representatives from our
  local education agency districts in support of development of a guidance document
  related to immigration rights.
- The timeline for the development of the 2025-26 Professional Learning Catalog has kicked off. The catalog is expected to be published in April 2025.
- In late November, the state accountability system released the index system ratings. Dr. Markita Hall will be presenting the data during the February 2025 board meeting. This is not an identifiable year, but if it were, Wayne County would have fewer schools in the bottom 5% (94 to 79).
- RESA received positive word that we have continued approval for 35a4 which funds K-3 Literacy COSAs.
- RESA has also received a \$1.8 million grant to support a set of districts (17) who are leading a K-5 Mathematics instruction materials adoption this year in partnership with RESA.
- In November, more than 22 individuals from Wayne RESA and Wayne County Districts participated in an aviation and aeronautics knowledge visit. They visited a K-12 Aviation and Aeronautics dedicated school in Bessemer, Alabama, a two-year design degree

- program and an aviation symposium in Atlanta, GA, the only of its kind in the country for districts and schools who have aviation focused programs. The group left with a number of key takeaways to begin working towards implementation.
- RESA will continue its support for districts as it relates to AI in January, working with superintendents to provide a presentation regarding district systems and supports for AI.

## Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, Kelly Bohl

Ms. Bohl shared the following updates:

- In preparation for Winter break, Kelly shared that RESA will be closed December 23 January 1, reopening January 2, 2025. Business Analysts have been scheduled to be available to provide support if needed, primarily on the finance application side for payroll purposes. There is also an emergency number for constituents.
- Lincoln Park Public School and Wayne RESA are excited about the open house and
  ribbon cutting at the new Beacon School on December 18. Phase one of the project is
  complete, and RESA has coordinated and organized the move for staff to be able to enjoy
  the break and return to school in their new space. Phase one prioritized the needs of the
  building to focus solely on the classroom spaces and to get everything ready to begin
  school.
- Work on the Annex is in progress. Racoon ladders on trees are coming down, trees
  around the Annex are being trimmed, and the pond has been dredged and is drying and
  will be completely filled in. The primary investment in the building is going to be
  bringing the building up to code and also designing what could be a new conference
  space.

### Assistant Superintendent of Financial Services, Drew McMechan

Mr. McMechan provided information for two action items on the December 18 meeting agenda. As was budgeted, two one-time payment distributions are being presented to the Board for approval, one for special education program costs and one for special education transportation costs. RESA will continue to monitor the budget. Hopefully, revenues will continue to increase and outpace expenditures, or at least to a level where can continue to provide much needed supplementary income and revenue for our constituent districts and PSAs.

### Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert

Dr. Daveda Colbert shared:

- Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert and the RESA Board of Education took a moment to acknowledge the senseless tragedy, the recent school shooting that took place in Madison, Wisconsin. Sadly, one student and one teacher did not return home from school and work. Six others were also injured. This is another example of a sad reality that we continue to face and fight against. We acknowledge the anxiety and pain that our school communities, and each of us relives each time a tragedy like this occurs. Our hearts, thoughts, and prayers extend to the Madison community and to all school communities across the country.
- School safety and mental health remain a top priority for our schools, districts, students, families, educators, and communities. We must remain vigilant about the health and safety of our school communities. It is imperative that we continue to advocate for safe school environments.

- We must continue to be present and supportive in our schools and communities. On Monday following the Madison school tragedy, a communication was forwarded to districts that included resources and communication strategies. A follow up email was sent on Tuesday to ensure that our school districts remained ready and had support to communicate, if needed. Educational environments, all learning environments, places of worship, and grocery stores, etc. should be safe, free from tragedies of this kind. As advocates for safe and healthy learning environments where all students can thrive, Wayne RESA will continue to advocate for school safety and mental health to remain a funding priority.
- Dr. Colbert served two years as the chair of the School Safety and Mental Health Commission and will resign in 2025. The next couple of months, she will continue to serve well in the role and ensure that the findings report with recommendations is finalized.
  - o Dr. Colbert was also appointed to the Gun Violence Prevention Task Force, representing schools and will continue to serve in that role in 2025.
- Dr. Colbert continued to celebrate and recognize the amazing work of the RESA teams that were highlighted during the December Board meeting:
  - o RESA's multilingual team has been working collaboratively with the Michigan Department of Education in support of the development of guidance documents related to immigration rights. The Leadership Team has also been meeting with community partners who have asked for our guidance on resources to families that supports various communities in knowing their rights.
  - O Partnership Districts 18-month Review meetings concluded this month. Kudos to Dr. Markita Hall, Executive Director, Educational Services and the five lead liaisons/Education Improvement Consultants who led in the space, coordinated and worked side by side with districts and the Michigan Department of Education to build systems that work that help to improve student outcomes.
  - o Some other supports in the last month to help constituent districts include working with the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) and legal on understanding requirements for athletic trainers. The MHSAA Executive Director, Mark Uyl, will join a q meeting next month to listen to concerns and answer questions around athletic trainers and other athletics related topics. This aligns with our ongoing advocacy work.
  - Title IX and Torte Liability are other hot topics that constituents are asking for additional guidance. Districts must understand and adhere to the most up-to-date Title IX requirements, and they must know and understand the definition of Torte Liability. Legal counsel has been requested to provide presentations in response to inquiries from our constituents.
  - O The MiLEAP Director of GSRP and the Director of Licensing joined one of our December constituent meetings to discuss successes and challenges with Pre-K for All and licensing requirements. They also took the time to visit a local district to get a better understanding of what districts/providers are experiencing as they aggressively move towards Pre-K for All.

- o Wayne County has signed up to be the first county to take part in the least restrictive environment reviews with the Michigan Department of Education Office of Special Education. Many of our districts will have site visits and Teri Rink, State Special Education Director, presented the expectations of the Cohort I Least Restrictive Environment visits to school leaders during the December LEA/PSA Superintendents meeting. Wayne County looks forward to the visits that will highlight our successes and identify areas where we need to continue to focus attention on additional improvement.
- O Wednesday, December 18, 2024, the RESA Board and members of the Leadership Team will be attending the Beacon Day Treatment School ribbon cutting. Special thanks to RESA's operations and technology teams and our leadership and Board of Education for making this all possible. We are excited about Beacon students transitioning into the new building in the new year with the move happening over break. Students, families, sending districts, and the staff at Beacon are very excited about this transition.
- O There is excitement about the Holiday Bazaar Sip and Shop event being held December 19, 2024 at Wayne RESA. The auditorium will be filled with Wayne County Special Education Directors and the hallways will be filled with center-based program students and staff and tables/stations filled with various displays for sale. RESA will support the students and staff from the center-based programs in the morning and in the afternoon, there will be an end-of-year celebration for RESA staff with "Soup with the Superintendent" on the third floor of the Education Center. This opportunity allows for fellowship and team building across departments.
- Dr Colbert acknowledged that while in Washington, D.C. last week, Senator Peters' office recognized the opportunity and are encouraging school boards across the country to advocate for IDEA on February 4, 2025, which is during the National School Boards Association (NSBA) Advocacy and Equity Symposium. This is the 50th year of IDEA, and the hope is that school board members across the county will advocate aggressively about the need to fully fund IDEA as promised at 40%, and to protect the funding from being cut.
- Dr. Colbert also highlighted that the School Finance Research Foundation (SFRF) 11y
   Infrastructure Study findings will be released in late January. The school district
   individual reports will be released via webinar on January 21, 2025.
- It has been an amazing calendar year! Dr. Colbert looks forward to continuing to work with the outstanding RESA Board of Education, the phenomenal RESA team and the amazing constituents who make Wayne County who we are. We are awesome because of each of us. It's because of the diversity and uniqueness of each of the communities, and the people throughout the county, which makes us who we are, Wayne County.
